Raised Track Report

The New Year's Day steam up at Tyttenhanger was enjoyed by those who attended despite the overcast weather, which fortunately only devolved into a downpour as we were locking up the workshop to leave. We had four engines running, three steam, one electric and one failure, which we won't talk about!

As we have sometimes done in the past, the New Year's Day run is an opportunity to try running on our track in the reverse direction. It may seem straight forward, but it is very easy to get caught out by the different configuration of the gradients and the length of them. What is normally a steep slope down to the Steaming Bay from the Station now becomes a mountain at 1-65 to climb back up to the station. My thanks to lan J for manning the coach and providing sustenance to all.



The Raised Track is now closed until further notice, whilst we make and pour concrete into the shuttering to make the four step-over blocks to assist access to the tunnel shed and the COSH cabinet.

The photo above shows two of the new step-overs at the tunnel along with the shuttering box ready for the next mix. The concrete is mixed in the car park and

poured straight into the bogie hopper wagon on the GLR (plastic lined first), pushed up to site for transfer by shovels, a very quick and easy exercise. We intend to take the opportunity at the same time to remake the step-over beside the lift out section on the new land. Also to rebuild the steps at the Steaming Bay to a better height and width.

The photo below shows the new roof on the garage, now awaiting the side fascia boards and refitting of the guttering. We have not identified any main beam sleepers that urgently require replacement this year, but we will be working on improving the ride quality around parts of the track.



Brian A and team are working hard on fitting new wheel blanks to some of our passenger cars, to replace the existing wheels, which have worn out. However, this has caused a problem in that the carriage lifting table is having to be modified to accept the slightly thicker flanges on the new wheels. It all makes work for the working man to do, as they say. Plenty to do on a Sunday morning at the track or even on a Thursday.

Much is happening still at Colney Heath, we have recently had The Tree Fellers in to remove dead and dangerous trees and branches.

New fencing is being erected adjacent to Orchard Junction Station.

The roof of the main station area, adjacent to the B Z Coach is having a major refurbishment.

The replacement of the garage roof is almost completed.

The G.L.R. Tunnel is now virtually covered over hiding all the hard work that has gone into it.

The traverser for the new steaming bay is starting to take shape and plans are in hand for the new machine shop that is to be sited close to the new steaming bays for the raised track.

Jet washing of the girder bridge and the paved areas has made these areas look much better and as if somebody owns them.

An expectant and enthusiastic group of members assembled at Headquarters. The expectant members were anticipating an evening of visual enjoyment and the enthusiastic ones were to supply it. They were not disappointed.

lan J welcomed the fellows, displayed the raffle prizes, explained the emergency procedures and appointed a fire warden. News of the successful New Year's Steam Up was announced and the last of the Fetes and Fairs events commented on. A great many rides were given by the band of devoted supporters at one event and none at all at a subsequent event, which had to be abandoned due to very inclement weather.

First off was Mike F with videos he had taken on his hols in Northern Europe with Angela and Rob Roy (not a member of the Scottish independence Party) but a rather smart 3 1/2" 0-6-0 tank locomotive. Mike had a cornucopia of events to show the assembled group. Scenes taken at Neuberger Ring, which was originally 14 miles of winding narrow country roads that was once the most terrifying motor racing track in history. The track was deemed too dangerous for competitive racing, but now seems to have been straightened a bit and the wrinkles ironed out. An item omitted from the January General Meeting Report.

The general meeting scribe has been reminded that he omitted to report on an item included in Mike's submission at the January gathering. It is included below.

The missing item concerned a visit to a foundry at or near Canary Wharf. The event witnessed on video by Mike was the casting of a facsimile of Nigel Gresley's head and perhaps a Mallard sculptured by Hazel Reeves. Rather dramatically molten bronze was poured into patterns on a rotary table one of which must have been Sir Nigels.

Sir Herbert Nigel Gresley 1876-1941 as the cognoscenti of the Society will know was one of the most famous locomotive engineers of the twentieth century. Born in Edinburgh educated at Marlborough and a premium apprentice at LNWR's Crewe Works. He became a pupil of John Aspinall at the L&Y Rly works at Horwich. Gresley then quickly rose through the ranks to become CME of the newly grouped LNER, where he designed and built some of the fastest locomotives in the world. His A1 pacifics were capable of over 100mph. (A disputed first) and his A4 Mallard held the world record of 126mph. His locomotives not only looked aesthetically pleasing but were very efficient. He used only two sets of Walschaerts valve gear for his three cylinder engines making them smooth and economical.

For many years Sir Nigel lived just up the road from Barnet at Salisbury Hall where he was able not only to design railway artefacts but also to study and feed local water fowl including Mallards.

A statue of Sir Nigel was unveiled at King's Cross, including his head but not his Mallard in April 2016 which was the 75th anniversary of his death.
