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FROM THE CHAIR

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2008/2009

Whilst I have been your Chairman, I have been very keen to promote social events where members and their families and friends can enjoy the facilities of the Society, particularly at Colney Heath.

The main social event of last year was, of course, the Gala Weekend, efficiently managed by our Peter Davies and his band of helpers. It was pleasing to note the involvement of most of the Society's Sections, as it was particularly a Society event for all members to enjoy. The Council encouraged Peter to use the event, opened by our President, to inaugurate the completion of the first phase of the Ground Level Railway, as well as the new loop on the Raised Track. Last summer was not noted for its summery weather, but the weekend was blessed with two days of sunshine, so that we all could enjoy the Colney Heath Site at its best.

These events take a lot of organisation and general management to make sure that all the events slot conveniently into place - the bands, the hog roast, the beer tent, the food and general catering. Our thanks again to all who contributed in whatever way to make that weekend such a success.

The year did have its difficulties, notably with the Headquarters, where we were threatened with a considerable rent increase. At the time of writing this report, this increase has not been applied to the Society, so we continue to pay our bills at the old rate. In May, the HQ building was raided by vandals, who broke in but fortunately nothing was taken. The roof of the old library caused trouble and leaked in the bad weather and ultimately, we had to call in roofing contractors to repair parts of the roof. The roof (and ceiling) have now been fully restored and the room is now dry and can again have a useful purpose.

In our usual fashion, the Locomotive Section entertained many charity visitors during the summer months. The children particularly enjoyed BIG BLUE, Laurie's large locomotive. There were, as usual, Club days when visitors from other Societies came to enjoy our tracks. Unfortunately, many visits were marred by poor weather. Conversely, after the poor summer, we had a more conventional winter with lots of snow. My main memory is a short video of Peter MacDonald charging through the snow drifts on the Ground Level track with his loco.

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This year the winter working parties have been in full swing on several days of the week. As a result of their efforts, the Raised Track anti-tip rails have been corrected as a safety measure. The Ground Level Railway has completed most of its planned track work, the bridge is up and painted, the points cross-overs are installed and as I write, the signal box is being constructed. The Ground Level Railway now looks more like a real railway with its various intersections. The area around the pond has been cleared of self-set plants and the prepared area will shortly be re-set with appropriate bushes and plants. The pond area, with its clear water, has become a most desirable feature of that part of our site.

During the rest of this year, members of the Garden Railway Section are preparing to move their track to the larger area of land within the Raised Track so that their locos can operate on a larger radius system. Perhaps with all their efforts, the unsightly nettle beds will be finally killed off and new grass grown.

Finally, after many years of enduring a muddy car park area, Laurie Steers, Peter Funk and others cleared away the compacted areas and built a circular roadway of road scalpings around the car park. This has proved most successful and has been operational throughout the winter. Some of the grass areas have been re-sown and, hopefully, by the drier summer months, we shall have a decent car park again.

I would like to thank our two editors who have been involved in the production of the News Sheet. In the autumn last year, Nick Rudoe stood down after several years in the editorial chair, and Nick Griffin successfully took over. Their efforts are much appreciated, as a large Society like ours, with its diverse activities, needs the News Sheet communication to keep us all in touch with the many events and activities which take place throughout the Society. Thanks to you both.

Lots of people, within the Sections and on the Council and Tyttenhanger Site Committee, freely give of their time and effort in making the Society work and prosper. Thank you all for your support in whatever contribution you make, and for making this year of my Chairmanship such a pleasant task.


TREASURER'S REPORT

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THE APRIL GENERAL MEETING BY OMAH

Mike Chrisp greeted us as usual and welcomed our speaker, Frank Banfield, who had brought another selection of vintage 16mm films from his collection. Upon being asked how many he had, he replied—"lots!"

Frank Banfield's first film was a 1952 BTF (Brtish Transport Films) largely dedicated to London trolleybuses, and their demise, but also covered the LT Museum contents, which was at Syon Park at that time. The next item was particularly interesting depicting Barnes Wallis talking to camera and covering his career in the aviation industry, with cutaway shots of film and still photos plus comments from people who knew him. While working for Vickers as a draughtsman and then designer, he was involved with the airship R80 shortly after WW1, moving on to the R100 c1924 (Nevil Shute also worked with him as Chief Calculator). Despite the success of the R100, the rival Air Ministry R101 crashed at Beauvais in 1930, putting an end to British airship involvement. Moving on to heavier than air machines he designed the Vickers 'Wellesley' followed by the 'Wellington', both of which used his geodetic frame originally, used in the R100. During WW2 he became part of a team of scientists working on suggestions, in their particular field, to assist the war effort. His suggestions included the 'bouncing bomb' and the 'earthquake' bombs 'Tallboy' and 'Grand Slam'. After the war he turned to supersonic aicraft, 'Swallow' was intended to have wings, which folded toward the tail once above take-off speed to reduce drag and increase air speed to supersonic (Swing-Wing). Embittered by the Air Ministry refusal to finance production he took the design to the US whom likewise declined to produce it but kept the set of drawings he had provided. Shortly afterward, they produced the F111 which bore a startling resemblance to his design. The Air Ministry then cancelled the BAC TSR-2 (a non swing-wing design) and ordered the F111! (In later years, he said that whenever he felt depressed he thought of the F111 which always cheered him up.)

This was followed by an ITN Roving Report showing rail transport in South America, all steam, showing the climb over the Andes, passengers being administered oxygen if required at the higher altitudes. They showed another climb in Lima. (Some of the route was covered by Mike and Angela Foreman a while back while on holiday). We then saw a miscellany of transport on the Clyde coast including some rather nice paddle steamers. Next was the building of an LNWR 4-4-0 No.6000, 'Coronation', c1911. Starting with the making of the component parts and finishing with the completed loco emerging from the shops was very interesting, particularly the total disregard for H&S, (They didn't appear any the worse for it.) After a Crewe miscellany we had a film called "Steel in the Midlands" showing the manufacture and

types of steel for various applications. One of the first shots was a rolling mill, this caused some sharp intakes of breath as the men feeding the stream of white hot steel from one roller end into the next. They just grabbed the end with a pair of tongs and swung it round into the next set of rollers with aplomb, they were standing on the shop floor at the same level as the steel which, had they missed it, would quite quickly have coiled round their legs. As each set of rollers decreases the diameter so does it increases the speed of transition, bet that kept them on their toes. What started as a hefty ingot finishes as a roll of wire. Among the special steels was some for the 'Comet', that dated it. Both interesting and in our area of activity.

A German canal with a tracked vehicle to drive the boat on then haul it up the rail track to the next level instead of using locks. (Tony Dunbar showed us a similar system some time ago when he returned from one of his trips). It was a balanced system with one boat coming down to help the other up.

The final offering was one I had seen before called "Dodging the Column" about the journey of an oil refinery tower from Greenwich to Grangemouth, quite an undertaking before the days of motorways. They had a tractor at the front and rear of the trailer, which enabled them to perform some extremely difficult turns. They came up against many obstacles but managed to overcome them and arrive at their destination a day early. A good end to another splendid evening of films

Mike mentioned that commercial boilers without CE marks, to indicate that they had been constructed to meet current requirements, would not be acceptable to insurance companies. In addition, club/etc boiler testers would not be permitted to test and cetificate them. Mike Foreman reminded us that subs were due, ideally accompanied by the short questionaire sent out with the newsheet. Mike Ruffell announced that a group from the Northolt MES would be visiting the track on October 10th.

Mike C had some sad news; Keith Catchpole had died on March 24th. Keith had entertained the Society on many occasions over the years and although he was not a member, his association with us merited that we should stand in silence as a tribute to his memory. The Society would be represented at the funeral.

David Harris, Mike Chrisp, and I attended Keith's funeral. It was a very moving service with over a 100 people present, Keith was involved in many activities and was obviously held in high esteem.

- 2. <u>APOLOGIES</u> for absence were received from Les Brimson, The Corcoran Family, Tony Dunbar, Jack Edwards, Peter Precious, Mike Ruffell.
- 3. **THE MINUTES** of the 63rd AGM held on 4 May 2007 were published in the May News Sheet and were taken as read. Brian Apthorpe proposed and Derek Perham seconded that they were a true record of the meeting. The meeting unanimously agreed and the Chairman duly signed them.
