This looks as though it is going to be a great weekend with many clubs invited and many large (and small) scale loco's in attendance.

We are still looking for someone to take on the running of the birthday parties at Colney Heath. Again a volunteer, or two, would be most welcome to this rewarding job.

I will look forward to seeing you all at the AGM on the 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2014.

#### **GLR News**

Hi crew and fellow enthusiasts, are you ready for the off! I am and by the time you read this we will have knocked the rust off the now joined up New Land development rail. The onsite workers have been very busy finishing off those last minute jobs and a great site clean up has begun. If there was a prize for squirreled away capacious amounts of JUNK we have won it hands down. Bang to rights, on the nose, it beggars belief how much there is. All of it so very useful even if we never use it. A large pile of this junk is accumulating by the raise track steaming bay. If any of it is yours you have until open season May 3<sup>rd</sup> to take it home or lose it forever as it will be disposed of. I would like to thank the crew for finishing off the electrical work and for making a start on organising container storage. The priority being club loco and passenger carriages followed by member's locos and carriages used for public hauling.

I know of five locos that are being built and two being purchased by members of the Tyttenhanger committee or GL crew. If they had used their time building their own locos and passenger cars instead of building our wonderful railway where would we put them now? With that in mind I will turn my attention to the G.L.R. allotted storage, hence the reorganisation of the cluttered containers and spaces in-between. Again I am thankful to members of the crew for the essential works being completed on and in the containers as this allows for the next job in line to be undertaken. Six box section joists have been welded across the openings to hold the extra weight of the roof tiles. I asked the steel firms governor to do the calculations on the steels and the rest is now history. The small but beautifully formed crew also helped me dig the footings and mix concrete. This now allows us to put the block work up in number two space and if he still wants to we eagerly await Phillip Woodward to start laying blocks. This end wall also forms part of the steaming bay project and as I understand it will have an opening/door built in so as to allow storage for five inch rolling stock on a mezzanine floor part way over the seven and a quarter storage. An interesting project for the right person if you are interested and want to help do come along on Saturday, Sunday or Thursdays you will be very welcome. I will probably get involved in this job myself by default as I wish to store my loco and carriages in this space and would be more than willing to help anyone interested.

Who said no one reads the newsletter. In last month's G.L.R. news I made a plea asking for a scaffold tower to help with putting the tiles on the container roof. Low and behold we had the offer to purchase one from a member's mum. The club now has another asset to be used for all those out of reach jobs safely. As you can see the worker/watcher ratio is about right for the perfect job. Young Mr Kitchener (I call him young because he is the only one who can climb on the roof and work crouching on his haunches) is re gauging the tile

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battens as someone fixed them wrong in the first place. To avoid any rows I don't mind taking the blame for this as my shoulders are broad and it's the least I can do.

Now that we have the scaffold, work continues at a breakneck speed. I don't know how we do it for the money.

Time to get back down the workshop. I think I may have just have time to hack out another piece of tinkerbell before hwmbo calls me up for tea.
